




Dean, School of Graduate Studies

The University of North Dakota is seeking candidates for the position of Dean of the School of Graduate Studies (SGS). Reporting directly to the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, the Dean will provide visionary leadership for graduate education at North Dakota's flagship university. This role offers an opportunity to advance UND's mission of excellence in research, scholarship and graduate student success in alignment with UND's strategic plan, UND LEADS.

UND seeks an exceptional, focused, and creative leader who will build upon the School of Graduate Studies' strengths to continue its growth and expansion and provide world-class educational experiences. The next dean will be a committed team member who is devoted to excellence and shared governance. The selected individual will be a consultative decision-maker and will work collaboratively with faculty, staff, students, administrators, and community and industry partners. The Dean will demonstrate the highest integrity and exemplary interpersonal and communication skills. The next dean of the School of Graduate Studies will also build extensive external relationships inside and outside of North Dakota, which boasts a robust industrial sector supported by the many graduate programs offered within the School.

The anticipated starting date of the new dean will be July 1, 2026, or as soon as reasonable thereafter.





THE SCHOOL OF GRADUATE STUDIES AT THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA

The School of Graduate Studies supports more than 3,400 master's and doctoral students across a wide-ranging array of both oncampus and online programming. The School of Graduate Studies provides support and administrative leadership for more than 160 degrees and certificates across eight colleges and schools. In the past year, nearly 900 master's degrees and over 350 doctoral degrees were awarded at the University of North Dakota.

Graduate programming at UND is growing. The last ten years have seen a 21% increase in graduate enrollment. In part, this growth in UND's graduate enrollment and programming is aligned with significant growth in the university's research profile. UND received \$192 million in research funding last year, and that research funding helped generate \$300 million in state-wide economic impact. These achievements have been recognized with a Carnegie R1 designation for very high research activity and doctoral production.

Because the School of Graduate Studies prides itself on preparing graduate students for the dynamic economy of the state, students can benefit from UND's partnerships with a wide range of businesses, government agencies, and nonprofits to tailor immersive experiences that advance their educational goals. In addition

to these experiences and connections, the School of Graduate Studies fosters student professional development and opportunity through a number of initiatives. For instance, the School of Graduate Studies sponsors an annual Graduate Research Achievement Day (GRAD) with virtual and on campus programs to showcase graduate students' work and to offer them the opportunity to present their research and creative activities to non-specialists, including fellow graduate students, faculty, and other members of the campus community. Similarly, the SGS sponsors a Three Minute Thesis (3MT) Competition, challenging students to present their research effectively in three minutes with the aid of only one PowerPoint slide.

A unique asset of the School of Graduate Studies is the Dr. Kathleen and Hal Gershman Graduate Center, a building dedicated to graduate education and excellence at UND. At the Gershman Graduate Center, graduate students can connect to their peers in a relaxed environment with an indoor lounge and an outdoor patio. The Center also provides resources to support students' academic success, including educational technology and multiple spaces for collaboration, consultation, and individual research.

The Dean serves as the chief administrator over the School of Graduate Studies. Under the direction of the Provost and in partnership with the members of the Deans' Council, the Dean of the School of Graduate Studies provides strategic leadership for shaping, growing, promoting, and administering initiatives that enhance the excellence of graduate programming and the graduate student experience at the university. The Dean of the School of Graduate Studies works with campus leadership and the University Senate to support strategic graduate program development and initiatives designed to provide innovative and dynamic graduate student support structures across the units of the institution. The Dean will provide leadership and facilitate an environment for accomplishing strategic goals, as well as aligning the functioning of the School of Graduate Studies with UND's broader academic identity and strategic planning.


The Dean is responsible for the budget and resources of the School, and works with leadership across the university, as well as with the University of North Dakota Alumni Association and Foundation (UNDAAF), on the advancement and development of those resources. The Dean of the School of Graduate Studies is a member of the Deans' Council and the Provost's Executive Team and represents the School of Graduate Studies to both internal and external constituencies as needed and appropriate.

The next dean of the School of Graduate Studies at UND will be joining the university during a period of momentum. Under the leadership of President Andrew Armacost since 2020 and Provost Eric Carl Link since 2021, the university has achieved record enrollment, advanced major campus improvements and secured substantial research activity. The Dean will build on these achievements by supporting and advancing UND's graduate enrollment and retention goals, fostering interdisciplinary research collaborations, and deepening external partnerships with industry, government and alumni to expand opportunities for graduate students.

The incoming Dean of the School of Graduate Studies will build on a long-standing tradition of excellence and work alongside both internal and external partners and stakeholders to increase and strengthen the mission of graduate education. Increasing access and opportunity for students and faculty through alumni and donor relations will be essential in the coming years as the university engages in robust, \$625 million, capital campaigning and relationship building, as will bringing key programmatic opportunities to the students within the school that will position them—and the school—for continued service to the state and the region.









Among the leadership and administrative functions of the Dean of the School of Graduate Studies are the following core responsibilities:

- Providing vision and leadership for the School of Graduate Studies in alignment with the University's strategic plan and the leadership vision and objectives of the Office of the Provost.
- Partnering to grow enrollment in UND graduate programming, enhance the impact and reputation of UND's graduate programs across the region and nationally, and grow the reputation of the university as a leading flagship research institution both nationally and globally.
- Serving as the chief administrator for the School of Graduate
 Studies and directing the operations of the unit.
- Representing the School of Graduate Studies on North Dakota University System (NDUS) initiatives and ensure compliance with NDUS reporting requirements.
- Supporting the growth of the research profile of the university through graduate programming, student and post-doc support, resource development, and advocacy.
- Collaborating on the development of a strategic array of interdisciplinary programs and innovative curriculum that will enhance graduate recruitment, enrollment, and persistence at the university, and will prepare graduates for career opportunities across both public and private industry, enterprise, and higher education.
- Overseeing policies and procedures related to graduate education at the University of North Dakota and ensuring compliance with all federal, state, and local regulations and requirements.

- Successfully leading and supporting graduate program assessment and accreditation initiatives.
- Providing visible advocacy to develop and advance resources for graduate education, including fundraising activities and stewarding an involved donor network for the School.
- Overseeing the development and administration of innovative and dynamic student support services that recognize the unique needs of online and on-campus students, fostering a culture of engagement, belonging, and responsiveness for graduate students at the university.
- Providing strategic oversight of the Gershman Graduate
 Center, ensuring its mission and initiatives remain aligned with institutional priorities and strategy.
- Administering policy and procedure related to Graduate
 Faculty Status among the professoriate of the university.

 Providing mentoring and professional training opportunities
 for graduate faculty.
- Administering processes and policies on campus related to the creation and awarding of graduate assistantships and fellowships and awards.
- Cultivating internship, externship, and research opportunities for graduate students at the university.
- Leading, directing, or participating in any/all shared governance processes and/or committees as they intersect directly with graduate studies at the institution.







Minimum Requirements

- A terminal degree in an academic field related to the disciplines within the School of Graduate Studies.
- At least five years of administrative and leadership experience within a higher education, or closely related, setting. At least three of those years should be at the level of Department Chair, Vice Provost, Assistant or Associate Dean, Associate VP, or the equivalent.

Preferred Qualifications

- Necessary experience and credentials to be eligible to serve as a member of the Graduate Faculty at the University of North Dakota.
- Experience in graduate education as a faculty member, including teaching graduate classes, mentoring graduate students, and serving on dissertation and/or thesis committees or a disciplinespecific equivalent.
- A record of accomplishment in higher education teaching, service, and research that would enable the candidate to hold the position of full professor in a department serving the School of Graduate Studies.
- Commitment to innovative teaching and program development across modalities and degree levels.
- · A record of leading innovative and entrepreneurial efforts.
- Demonstrated leadership in fostering community and belonging and addressing the needs of underserved and underrepresented students.
- Experience in positively impacting student recruitment, enrollment, and retention.
- Demonstrated commitment to shared governance and faculty and staff development, and experience with, or a commitment to, team-based leadership and collaborative problem solving.
- Experience in recruitment, retention, supervision and mentorship
 of high-quality and diverse faculty and staff; administration of
 the promotion and tenure process; and staff development with a
 significant emphasis on succession and workforce planning.
- Experience working collaboratively with senior university leadership, state organizations, and/or legislative governing bodies.
- Commitment to establishing and growing internal and external partnerships.
- Experience with fundraising and/or engagement with external constituencies.
- An understanding of higher education finance, budgeting and resource allocation, as well as a record of responsible management of resources.

Core Competencies & Characteristics

The ideal Dean of the School of Graduate Studies should:

- Articulate a strategic, innovative, future-oriented vision, responsive to the needs of North Dakota, as well as the region.
- Foster strong collaborations within the university and with external partners, including commerce and industry.
- Actively engage with North Dakotans, be present across campuses, and establish relationships within various communities—urban, rural, and indigenous.
- Effectively communicate the School's achievements and needs to all stakeholders; advocate for its programs before policymakers; and maximize the tools of marketing, including social media.
- Demonstrate respect for the various disciplines, STEM and non-STEM; identify opportunities for new programs across modalities and interdisciplinary approaches; and align innovations with the demands of the market and the needs of students.
- Relying on a personal record of scholarly success, uphold high academic standards and inspire consistent policies and outcomes across all programs.
- Be an active listener with responsive and timely follow-up and follow-through skills.
- Prioritize strong support, fair treatment, and mentorship for graduate students.
- Demonstrate capacity to secure financial resources to support research for faculty and students within the programs.
- While pursuing clearly articulated strategy, strive for balance in allocating resources across programs and among graduate students.
- · Lead with kindness, compassion, organization, and integrity.





Champion collaboration, expansion & innovation

Joining the University at a time of exceptional enrollment growth, impressive expansion of external funding and philanthropic support, and recent achievement of Carnegie's R1 status, the Dean will advance an ambitious agenda that builds upon this strong institutional momentum. UND excels in several distinctive fields, including aviation, aerospace studies, national security, forensic science, indigenous health, and more. Under the leadership of the next dean of the School of Graduate Studies, the University seeks to continue along a path of strategic growth across graduate programming and enrollment.

Consistent with the University's mission, the next dean will advocate effectively for the School of Graduate Studies by clearly communicating its achievements and opportunities to a wide variety of audiences, including public officials. The Dean will elevate the School's visibility and enhance its strong reputation across the state and beyond. Attentive to both the regional workforce needs and student aspirations, the Dean will champion growth that prepares students for meaningful and fulfilling careers.

Advance innovation across graduate education

Joining an innovative environment that values experimentation and cross-campus collaboration, the Dean will take the lead in identifying emerging fields of study and anticipating shifts in the broader marketplace. The Dean will pursue opportunities aligned with the University's values and coordinate initiatives that succeed across colleges and departments.

Imagining both disciplinary and interdisciplinary paths forward, the Dean will clearly communicate promising possibilities; convene and engage colleagues; foster cooperative relationships across administrative units; and make collaborative and creative decisions about the allocation of resources to realize the University's success. Working closely with other deans, as well as with faculty and other administrators, and in accordance with shared governance, the Dean of the SGS will lead and achieve impactful growth that advances the University's commitment to advance the state and the region.

Deepen & extend partnerships with governments, industries & communities

Arriving at a moment full of promise, the next dean will play a key role in securing resources to support graduate education. With substantial support from both federal and state governments, as well as from private philanthropy, UND has already developed significant assets, including the Mark & Claudia Thompson National Security Corridor and Center for Cyber Security Research in the College of Engineering and Mines, the UND Tech Accelerator, biomedical sciences facilities in the School of Medicine and Health Sciences.

and the many initiatives in earth and space science housed within the John D. Odegard School of Aerospace Studies.

The University maintains longstanding partnerships with local, regional, and national stakeholders, including corporations, industries, communities, and school systems to advance and achieve mutually beneficial goals, from experiential learning for students to practically focused research. Significant opportunities remain across the state and region, and the next dean will be instrumental in realizing them.

Recent fundraising successes have delivered impressive capital investments that have transformed the campus and positioned UND for future opportunities. These successes also create a strong foundation for the next dean to expand engagement with donors in support of the School's mission.

Working with colleagues in the UND Alumni Association and Foundation, the next dean will pursue and secure funds to support existing and new programs; to expand support for student fellowships, scholarships, and assistantships; and to facilitate the interdisciplinary collaboration essential for the institution's future.

Foster graduate student success, research & impact

With UND's graduate enrollment growing and its research enterprise expanding, the next dean will strengthen and extend the University's culture of student support to empower every graduate student. The Dean will champion initiatives that strengthen community, promote belonging, and provide comprehensive academic, professional, and personal development resources for all graduate learners.

The Dean will work collaboratively with faculty, staff, and campus partners to ensure graduate programs use effective instructional tools and pedagogical practices; that faculty are supported in mentoring and teaching excellence; and that all students, regardless of delivery mode, are engaged in the intellectual and social life of the University.

Recognizing the diverse needs of UND's graduate population, including international, online, and on-campus students, the next dean will play a pivotal role in fostering environments where graduate students contribute meaningfully to North Dakota's workforce, regional innovation, and the University's research enterprise. The Dean will partner closely with Enrollment Management, the Division of Research & Economic Development, and other academic leaders to attract, retain, and empower talented graduate students who advance the University's mission and the vitality of the state.

The successful candidate will bring strategic vision to this work, addressing challenges proactively while cultivating opportunities that enable every graduate student to thrive and achieve their academic, professional, and personal goals.



The University of North Dakota celebrated a historic milestone for fall 2025 with 15,844 students enrolled, the largest student body in UND's history.

As the largest and most diverse university in the state, UND enrolls students from all 50 states and nearly 100 countries. Enrollment is on the rise, fueled by strong freshman classes and growing interest from students across the state, the nation and around the world. In fact, according to North Dakota University System enrollment dashboards, UND is the #1 destination of choice for North Dakota residents – boasting the most of any other institution in the state.

UND students are high-achieving and motivated — with average incoming GPAs above 3.6 and an increasing number of Presidential and National Merit Scholars.

Student success is a top priority: UND consistently posts one of the highest retention rates among the North Dakota University System's 11 campuses, reflecting strong academic support and a vibrant campus life.

UND's nine colleges and schools each brings distinctive strengths:

John D. Odegard School of Aerospace Sciences

A global leader in aviation and unmanned aircraft systems, UND operates the largest civilian training fleet in the world and was the first university to join the U.S. Space Force's University Partnership Program. The Space Studies Department has a new lab located at the Space Life Sciences Laboratory at NASA's Kennedy Space Center. The Air Traffic Management program is one of the first to be part of the FAA's Collegiate Training Initiative, addressing critical national workforce needs.

Accredited since 1923, UND is home to the only law school in North Dakota. It is nationally recognized for excellence in Indian and Tribal Law and for preparing attorneys to serve in rural and regional communities. More than 75% of North Dakota's practicing attorneys are UND Law alumni. Consistently recognized as a "best value law school," the UND School of Law ranks in the top ten law schools with the least amount of student debt.

School of Medicine & Health Sciences

As the state's only medical school, UND educates the majority of North Dakota's family physicians and other healthcare professionals. It's ranked in the Top 5 in the nation for most graduates practicing rural medicine by U.S. News & World Report. The School also created the world's first Ph.D. in Indigenous Health, a groundbreaking program advancing equity and health outcomes for Indigenous communities.

College of Nursing & Professional Disciplines

Meeting critical workforce needs in nursing, nutrition and social work, UND prepares compassionate, practice-ready professionals through nationally ranked programs. Its simulation and clinical training facilities provide hands-on experience, while flexible online options expand access for rural and working professionals. UND nursing graduates consistently achieve licensure exam pass rates above national averages and are recognized for excellence in patient care and community impact.

The University of North Dakota is a Carnegie R1: Very High Research Activity institution — a designation shared with only 187 universities nationwide and representing about 4.7% of the nearly 4,000 degree-granting institutions in the nation. UND reported more than \$192 million in annual research expenditures and secured over \$150 million in external research awards each year, placing it firmly among the nation's top research universities.

UND's success is further strengthened by state investments in national security and economic diversification research, ensuring UND faculty and students have the resources to drive innovation.

The Grand Challenges

UND has defined six Grand Challenges that help diversify North Dakota's economy and address social issues.

Autonomous Systems


UND is a global leader in unmanned and autonomous technologies, advancing innovations that span ground, air, maritime and space systems. Through the Research Institute for Autonomous Systems (RIAS) and the first Center for Unmanned Aircraft Systems Research, Education & Training in the nation, UND collaborates with the FAA, Department of War and NASA to develop next-generation technologies for safety, communication and human–machine teaming. The University's work in beyond-visual-line-of-sight flight, detect-and-avoid systems and Al-driven autonomy positions North Dakota as a national hub for this rapidly expanding industry.

Computational & Data Science

UND is harnessing the power of big data, artificial intelligence and high-performance computing to solve real-world challenges. The Computational Research Center supports projects ranging from climate modeling and digital agriculture to defense analytics and cybersecurity. Recent collaborations include the development of Al-driven predictive systems for Arctic operations and advanced machine learning applications in unmanned systems. With new investments in research computing infrastructure and partnerships across academia, government and industry, UND is building the capacity to turn data into discovery and insight that drives progress for North Dakota and beyond.

Energy & Environmental Sustainability

UND is advancing energy innovation and environmental responsibility through interdisciplinary research that strengthens both North Dakota's economy and global energy security. The Energy & Environmental Research Center (EERC) and Institute for Energy Studies lead initiatives in carbon capture, enhanced oil recovery, hydrogen power, renewable energy and battery storage. Faculty are pioneering ways to extract rare-earth elements from lignite coal, reducing U.S. dependence on foreign suppliers, while also improving wind energy and smart grid technologies. With one of the nation's largest university-based energy enterprises and deep partnerships across industry and government, UND is shaping the future of clean, affordable and sustainable energy.





Human Health

UND is tackling today's most pressing health challenges through discovery, innovation and collaboration. UND's School of Medicine & Health Sciences leads research that improves the quality of life for North Dakotans and beyond, addressing diseases such as Parkinson's, Alzheimer's, stroke, cancer and addiction. The University hosts one of only six USDA Human Nutrition Research Centers in the nation and has secured continuous NIH Centers of Biomedical Research Excellence (COBRE) funding for more than 15 years. UND researchers are advancing understanding in neuroscience, infectious disease and epigenetics, while pioneering partnerships that connect clinical practice, public health and translational science to deliver real-world impact.

National Security & Space

UND is advancing the nation's defense and space capabilities through cutting-edge research, workforce development and strategic partnerships. The University's National Security Initiative (NSI) builds capacity in autonomy, space operations, medicine and energy — supported by millions in new UND investments and state funding for space-related research infrastructure. A new Nanofoundry for national security materials is developing advanced thin films for secure communications and quantum computing, while the College of Engineering & Mines has been designated a National Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Research (CAE-R) through 2029. UND's collaborations with the U.S. Space Force, Space Command and the Department of War position North Dakota as a hub for next-generation national security innovation.

Rural Health & Communities

North Dakota leads national efforts to improve health outcomes and quality of life in rural and tribal communities. Through the Center for Rural Health, the Behavioral Health Initiative and the Department of Indigenous Health, UND addresses barriers to care, behavioral health needs and workforce shortages across the region. The School of Medicine & Health Sciences anchors these efforts through partnerships with more than 1,200 clinical faculty statewide. UND's research and outreach programs build healthier, more resilient communities across North Dakota and beyond.







As an integral part of life at UND, our Fighting Hawks athletic teams foster school spirit, community pride and national recognition.

- UND competes in 17 NCAA Division I sports, offering student-athletes opportunities to excel on the field and in the classroom.
- Student-athletes post strong graduation and GPA rates, while contributing more than 7,000 hours
 of community service each year ranking UND among the top 5 universities nationwide for
 student-athlete service.
- The men's hockey program is one of the most storied in the nation, with 8 national championships and more than 100 players advancing to the NHL.
- The University boasts state-of-the-art athletic facilities including the Ralph Engelstad Arena,
 Alerus Center and Betty Engelstad Sioux Center. Recent additions highlight UND's momentum:

Flight Operations Building & Hangar (2025–26)

A 179,000-square-foot facility replacing Hyslop Sports Center, designed for interdisciplinary teaching and research across STEM fields, robotics and esports.

Together, these projects reflect UND's strong partnerships with students, alumni, donors and the state, ensuring the campus remains a place of innovation, excellence and belonging for future generations.





UND's **Model for Incentive-Based Resource Allocation** (MIRA) ensures that resources are aligned with the University's mission and priorities. The model emphasizes:

UND'S ECONOMIC IMPACT & STATEWIDE ROLE

As the state's flagship and most comprehensive research university, UND serves as North Dakota's chief opportunity engine. With more than \$1.48 billion in annual economic impact, UND fuels business activity, supports nearly 10,000 jobs and generates millions in state and local tax revenue.

UND's contributions reach far beyond its campus:

Workforce Development: UND is the primary center for professional education and training in the state, educating the majority of North Dakota's physicians, attorneys, engineers, teachers and business leaders.

Energy Leadership: The Energy & Environmental Research Center (EERC) and the College of Engineering & Mines drive advances in carbon capture, enhanced oil recovery and the commercialization of rare-earth minerals — making UND a key player in the nation's energy future.

Diversification & Innovation: UND helps expand North Dakota's economy through pioneering work in unmanned aircraft systems, autonomous technologies and national security research, partnering with agencies such as the FAA, Department of War, Department of Homeland Security and NASA. The new UND CONNECT program — funded by the N.D. Economic Diversification Research Grant — is a faculty-led program that fosters partnerships and delivers local impact through student learning.

Regional Partnerships: The Division of Research & Economic Development works closely with city, state and regional economic development groups, including targeted initiatives to grow the UAS sector and attract new industries to the state.

Through education, research and collaboration, UND strengthens North Dakota's economy while addressing challenges of national and global importance.

Economic Engines

North Dakota is a national leader in energy and agriculture. The state ranks among the top producers of oil and natural gas and is the third-leading energy producer in the nation. The Legacy Fund, a multibillion-dollar savings account created from energy revenues, ensures future prosperity for residents.

The state also leads the nation in the production of spring wheat, beans, canola, flaxseed and honey, while a growing manufacturing sector supports food processing and agricultural equipment. North Dakota also has emerged as a hub for unmanned aerial systems (UAS), one of the fastest-growing industries, supported by strong public-private partnerships.

Tourism & Natural Beauty

Tourism is the state's third-largest industry, highlighted by the Badlands and Theodore Roosevelt National Park, the historic town of Medora (future home of the Theodore Roosevelt Presidential Library) and the International Peace Garden. Residents and visitors alike enjoy abundant opportunities for hunting, fishing, hiking and year-round outdoor recreation across North Dakota's 20 state parks and recreation areas.
